DOWNFALL DUE TO GAMBLING

Widnes Official Sentenced

£400 EMBEZZLED

Porter Who Became Relieving Officer

"JOB ABOVE HIM"

A former porter's appointment to the position of relieving officer, and his lapse through gambling, was described at the County Quarter Sessions in Liverpool, to-day, when William Henry Evans (59), of Cedar-avenue, Widnes, was sentenced to six months in the second division.

Evans pleaded guilty to thirteen counts of embezzling the moneys of Widnes Public Assistance Committee. The total defalcations were stated to total more than £400.

Mr. Easenhig, prosecuting, said the accused was appointed relieving officer of the Westcot Board of Guardians in March, 1924. When the Lancashire Public Assistance Committee took over the duties of the Guardians, Evans continued as relieving officer for the North Widnes district.

It was part of his duty to collect amounts due to the Relief Committee from relatives of patients in the Widnes Institution and Rathmill Mental Hospital.

—POCKETED THE MONEY—

He was instructed, on receiving payment from the relatives, to give an official receipt and hand the money to the bank. In addition, he was supposed to insert a record of the payments on his case-papers dealing with each patient.

It was found, however, that he had issued unofficial receipts and had pocketed the money.

The embezzlement was discovered when the treasurer sent out letters asking the relatives of patients why arrears had not been paid.

On the accused's investigations, which were not yet completed, now showed that the defalcations totalled £425 5s 10d.

—POST ABOVE HIM—

Mr. Hartley Swales, defending, said Evans had excellent references as an industrious official. About two years ago he was employed as a porter, and then he was suddenly transferred to the position of relieving officer, responsible for collecting about £150 a week.

"No doubt the job was rather above him," continued Mr. Swales, "for it was not his business to be in need of money, and was tempted to borrow small sums."

He gambled, in the hope of winning enough to put it back, and, of course, he lost.

"He intends to make whatever restitution he can."

BIG SOCIETY WEDDING

EARL OF DUMFRIES AND LADY EILEEN FORBES

Two leading Catholic families—one Scottish and the other Irish—were united by the marriage of the Earl of Dumfries and Lady Eileen Forbes, at a splendid Irish church, Newtown Forbes, Ireland.

The Earl of Dumfries, who is the heir of that ancient family, was born in Wales, is the eldest son of the Marquis of Dumfries, and is a close friend of the Prince of Wales.

SHIP FIREMAN'S LOSS OF AN EYE

COLOURED MAN AND L'POOL SHIPOWNERS

A coloured fireman's loss of an eye was described in a workman's compensation case, at the Liverpool County Court, to-day, when a settlement was announced.

The applicant, James Samuel Koj, of Upper Hulton-street, Liverpool, alleged that, while serving as a fireman on the steamer R. L. Holt, owned by Messrs. John Holt, Ltd., of Liverpool, on May 5, at sea, he opened a furnace door in the stokehold to see that the fires were all right, when a spark from a packing case which was being burnt flew into his right eye.

He immediately complained and the eye was examined by the chief engineer, but he was unable to observe any foreign matter in it. It was, however, treated with lotion.

On the vessel's arrival at Hamburg the applicant became a patient in the University Eye Clinic there, and the eye was removed and a false one substituted.

TRAGIC CRASH AT SEA

MALTA, Tuesday

Lieutenant P. L. H. D. Iren, of the aircraft-carrier Glorious, and Midshipman Archibald Hamilton, of the battleship Resolution, lost their lives when the Ripon seaplane in which they were flying was forced to come down in the sea off the western coast of Malta.

The pilot, after parachuting down, failed to reach the shore, and was killed by a machine gun which was fired from the ship.

The bodies were taken to the naval hospital at Malta.

ANOTHER R.A.F. DISASTER

Planes Collide In Mid-Air

ONE PILOT KILLED

The Other Saved By His Parachute

NAVAL FLIERS PERISH

From Our Own Correspondent

Two R.A.F. planes collided at Hartfield, near East Grinstead, to-day. One pilot, Flying Officer Johnston, was killed, and the other, Sergeant Jack, escaped by parachute.

The machines were flying between Coleman's Hatch and Hartfield, when their wings touched, and one nose-dived into a cottage garden.

The other remained in the air long enough for the pilot to jump clear.

The pilot of the machine which succeeded was killed instantly when his machine crashed with terrific force.

The engine was buried in the ground, and the plane was smashed to pieces.

PILOT PHONES NEWS

The second machine landed a mile away, in the orchard of Hodore Farm, near Hartfield, burst into flames, and was destroyed.

Its pilot, after parachuting down, failed to reach the shore, and was killed by a machine gun which was fired from the ship.

The other crew member, Midshipman Hamilton, was rescued by a boat from the ship.

The bodies were taken to the naval hospital at Malta.

A court of inquiry is proceeding.
